
"Torres Reunion Take Away" by Jason Cole (p. 22)




You know it. So stop thinking about other people and work on yourself.

10 Reasons Why Integrity Matters


- 1. You become reliable. When you have integrity, people trust and rely on you more.

Hello, I'll start off by saying God is a miracle worker.


Two years ago, I never would've thought that I would become sober (willingly) for any amount of time. I loved any drug and all alcohol. That was my strongest desire: to be high all the time. My most favorable choice was shooting methamphetamine. It took me down quick. I became I thief too. I was addicted to petty theft. My family is a very loving one. They stuck by me through a lot. I put them through hell.

I believe the Lord put it on their hearts to not give up on me. I grew up going to church but, I didn't care about God or church or anything much except entertaining myself with media and drugs when I got to my preteen years.

Finally, after about 10 years of off and on legal trouble (probation terms, parole, rehab, sanctions, jail) over and over again, I decided something had to change. During my prison sentence I accepted Christ as my Savior, but I still tried to do it my way when I got paroled out.

In a matter of months, I relapsed and picked up a new charge. Then I repented of my relationship of drugs and alcohol. God intervened on my and my family's behalf. I only served nine months in SAFP at the Kyle unit. I should've been gone for the long hall, but by the grace of God I met Ruben and took his blueprint classes every chance I could get. There is

and be different. He said the reason that Daniel and his three friends were able to do so could be found in verse eight of Daniel chapter one. "But Daniel purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the king's delicacies..." Daniel *purposed* in his heart not to defile himself and that is what we must do as well.



I remember reading and studying that as I sat in the Torres prison unit doing my time. I was excited, encouraged, and felt as bold as Daniel. Many years later after leaving prison and joining the "free world," I found out just how hard it is to stick to that idea. I purpose in my mind not to defile myself, but I don't have the discipline to walk that out every day.

This past weekend, we had a Torres reunion. Many of the brothers who did time in Torres showed up to worship, hear the Word, eat, and fellowship. Man, it was so good to see the familiar faces. It was amazing to remember walking with them in a white jumpsuit and seeing them now in nice clothes. We remembered where we came from. We talked about all the things in prison we swore we'd never forget or take for granted. We laughed about how it takes about two weeks of freedom to forget all those very things!

Last week at church a special guest speaker came and preached the house down. His topic was on a subject that was one of my very first sermons, so I was anxious to hear what he had to say. He was preaching on Daniel and his three buddies. After they were taken captive as slaves, they were forced to learn the Babylonian culture, language, customs and even were told to eat their food.


Some of the Babylonian foods went against the law that Daniel lived under as a Hebrew. So, Daniel asked to be given a certain time frame to eat the way they were accustomed to and promised they would look better and be in better shape than the other men.

Later, in the book of Daniel we see Daniel's three friends being forced into the fiery furnace for not bowing down to the golden image of the king. God rescues them. Further into the book, Daniel is thrown into the

os and just go with the flow. Just like the religious leaders of Jesus' time who were afraid to lose their status before the Roman government due to God's power working in Him, so, too, can some people be so disturbed by God moving in and through a person that they will engage in various schemes to topple them. When a culture that is bent on denying the power of God and when a world of people who cannot stand when they are being overshadowed by the glory of Christ in their midst, bad things always follow.

We must be careful, though, because if we go with this flow and act like the band of brothers who kidnapped Joseph, we become much like a kidnapper of Truth. When we can't stand to see God moving in our midst through someone committed to His cause, we become like those who crucified the Lord of glory. And when we act like that, we are no longer thinking for ourselves but are enslaved to the power of lies and are being controlled by a hellish scheme to undermine the power of God in our midst.

You see, when someone is speaking truth, those in power who are doing the wrong will *always* silence the one speaking up. They did it to the prophets of old; they did it to Jesus; they do it in politics; they do it in churches; they do it in the workplace. They do it because they are wicked. They hate to see God strong, because it makes them look puny—and they don't want to lose their power over others. This was one of the main reasons why the wicked rulers crucified Jesus. His Truth was overshadowing their self-image and exposing their lie.

Let's *not* be like that.

Instead, let's celebrate God's power to heal hearts and change lives. Let's celebrate when people are being transformed by the Gospel. Because if we look more at the vessel that God uses to affect change in others, rather than at what God is doing through them, we are missing the entire of point of God choosing the foolish things of this world to do His work, because remember: God calls the *ugliest* people of this world to reach the *ugliest* people of this world to reach the *ugliest of this world* to reach the *ugliest of this world*.

Kidnapping the Truth

"Then many of the Jews who had come to Mary, and had seen the things Jesus did, believed in Him. But some of them went away to the Pharisees and told them the things Jesus did. Then the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered a council and said, 'What shall we do? For this Man works many signs. [Here it is, folks!] If we let Him alone like this, EVERYONE WILL BELIEVE IN HIM, AND THE ROMANS WILL COME AND TAKE AWAY BOTH OUR PLACE AND OUR NATION." (Jn. 11:45-48)

The idea presented in this true story is that wicked people will do anything to remain in power, and one of the best ways to achieve this is to SILENCE TRUTH. To ban it. To malign and discredit it. Jesus said of these folks: "And this is the condemnation, that light has come in the the world, and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil. For everyone practicing evil hates the light and does not come to the light, lest his deeds should be exposed" (Jn. 3:19, 20).

We must twice about who we believe is the "good guy" in a world governed by political, religious, and social discourse. For example, think about the story of Joseph (Genesis chapter 37 through 50), who was betrayed by his older brothers because they were envious of his status before their father. They hated that he was "dad's favorite", so they kidnapped him and sold him into slavery. Hatred, envy, jealousy, and insecurity often remain clustered together in a darkened and wounded heart and will have folks do some very unkind things.

But God always has a plan for those who remain submitted and surrendered to Him.

We must exercise caution when the power of God is suppressed and maligned, because it's easy for us to get swept away in a current of confusion and cha-



absolutely amazing being with a circle that is accepting and downright fun to be around. I mean seriously, who wants to spend their time around people who don't like them and don't want to see them succeed?



But guess what?

What good is a calling if you are only around those who have already been called and know where they are headed in life?

My entire life, my mom had me around believers. Since I was 5 years old and can remember, I wanted Jesus in my life. I felt so loved and connected to Him while the rest of the world seemed dark and dim. He was and is always my safe space. Because of that, in the seasons of my own darkness, though miserable at times, I was never truly alone. It isn't so for everyone, though. Some people don't know Him at all, which makes it even harder to see what those of us who do know Him see and feel without effort. Reluctantly, I have always been called to those who don't see Him. I can remember times I would be at the bar, and a complete stranger would come ask me about Jesus. I'm like, "Really dude? Not

now."

But that's just it. WE ARE THE LIGHT. In everything we do and everywhere we go. We don't have to know exactly what to say. We don't have to know exactly who to talk to. We just need to go. And I can promise as someone who has been sober for six years, I'm way more at peace in my walks and talks with Jesus now. The more willing and prepared we are to let God speak and lead for us, the less difficult it is to be in those corners where we know we are less welcome. Some-

times we have to step out of our comfort not just to learn for ourselves, but there are many who might get to know Jesus by watching us stumble and get back up again.

So, if you're like me and in a season where people are watching and waiting for you to fail, if you'd rather tuck your head and walk the other way out of fear of saving or doing the wrong thing, THINK OF JONAH. Think of the whale or big fish that swallowed him when he ran. God already had the plans set, and at some point, Jonah said, "Send me, God. I'll go," but when he found out where he was getting sent, like a stubborn soldier, he no longer wanted to take on that battle even though God already knew the end victory!

If you fell down this week, I encourage you to get back up. If you didn't fall but instead ran out of the fear of failing, keep going. Take that leap. Not just for you, but for those who will be inspired by your strength when they see you continue onward.

Thank you, pastor, and family. Welcome to our community. I was going a completely different direction. Last night I prayed for alignment, and I truly believe your sermon showed me exactly where I needed to be today.



UNRECOGNIZABLE Language

"In those days I also saw that the Jews had married women from Ashdod. Ammon, and Moab. As for Their children, half spoke in the language of Ashdod, and none of them was able to speak the language of Judah, but the language of his own people." (Nehemiah 13:22,23 NASB)

Lately, I have had a heavy heart when it comes to so many of the pastors and speakers of the Christian faith. Too many have, "unrecognizable language," that in part sounds biblical, and yet is so far from the Word of God.

As we read the Word from the book of Nehemiah let me make something clear; Nehemiah was a reformer, Nehemiah stated that his motive was placed in his heart by God. (7:5) What we also read is the obedience to God's Word.

How many times do we hear pastors and so many others state, "God called me," and yet stray far away from God's truth. They overlook the Word of God and call sin a mental struggle, say that God still loves them as they are and even within the church, they do not follow the will and order of God. All because they feel they are called.

Nehemiah admonished the people, but they disobeyed the command to not mix in marriage, as so many churches are mixing the feelings of the world and the word of God. Hence, we are building a church that to God has an unrecognizable language. Too many are speaking a word that is compromised with the culture of their strange wives they have espoused and lead them to leave the language of God's Word for a word that creates man into a god, to be a lover of self and money hungry. They teach a doctrine that is not biblical nor honoring God (1 Tim. 3:1-5). A word with no power, demanding and so-called creators of their own way (Prov. 3:5,6).

Nehemiah confronted the sin of the people as we are called to uphold the word of God, just as Nehemiah not only spoke God's command, but the consequence of disobeying such command. Yet today we are almost afraid of doing so. We'd rather promote a God of blessings, of callings and of gifts. The world today is straying from the church, not because of God, but because of those that claim to be His ambassadors have created a worldly church. So, if the church is in the image of world, why would the world need that God? They are already of serving the god of this world.

What language do you speak?

What are those around you really hearing; are they hearing the word of God or a version that only has a sprinkle of God but more common with the world. Our words must not carry the culture, the likeness of worldly doctrine, or be encouraged to please the flesh. At the pulpit do they find a person speaking compromise or the standard of God? Do we see a pastor more in tune with his own opinions and beliefs or with the Holy Spirit and the leading of God's Word.

May we be like Nehemiah and seek out the holiness and obedience that God requires of us.
